Hello Playschool Families!

It is time to look ahead to some fun Christmas traditions! We are once again selling freshly baked gingerbread house kits, and gingerbread men. The houses are larger than those typically found in stores and include ample icing and candy! The gingerbread men include icing (no candy). This will be our fourth year selling these kits as one of our Christmas fundraisers, and they are delicious and fun to build and decorate!

The gingerbread is baked and assembled by a retired professional baker. In light of Covid-19, he is taking extra precautions and sanitization to ensure everyone's safety. Once the gingerbread is ready, we will deliver it to the playschool, where families will be able to pick up their order from the parking lot.

Gingerbread ingredients: Ginger, Cinnamon, Pastry flour, All-purpose shortening, Salt, Sugar, Black strap molasses, Baking soda Icing ingredients: Sugar, Water, Cream of tartar, Meringue powder

*** The types of candy included are not identical in each kit***

We are selling the gingerbread house kits for \$25 each. The cost to us is \$17, so that means you earn \$8.00/house towards your fundraising commitment. Gingerbread men cost \$20/12 or \$10/6. You earn \$6/dozen towards your fundraising commitment. Please feel free to sell to family and friends!

WALKYOUR BLOCK!

This fall, the Neighbourhood Watch program that we focused on was "Walk Your Block". Research has shown that crime is significantly reduced where community residents are visibly present and actively involved on their streets and in their neighbourhoods.

With the challenges that Covid-19 poses in regards to connection and socialization, "Walk your Block" is a perfect way to stay active, get to know your neighbours and stay connected, all while helping to reduce crime. Anyone can participate in this program at any time. Simply take a walk in your neighborhood whenever you like!

While you are walking, take note of the homes and cars in your area and what does and does not belong. If you see suspicious activity, report it to the non-emergency police line at (780)423-4567. If you see a crime in progress, call 911 and do not engage.

cipal health adviso- the middle of October. ries related to COVID-19 were inacted, the Lessard Community League (like other community leagues around our city) closed our hall to public gatherings in order to limit the potential for the virus' transmission.

It was not an easy decision to make as it has limited our ability to gather, celebrate, and enjoy each others' company. However, knowing that we are collectively contributing to the larger global effort of reducing the burden rental agreement guidelines. on our health care system is something we should all be proud of.

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A drink as old as our city The Whisky Sour

ABOUT THIS COLUMN

The Cocktail Corner is intend to be a light-hearted paper version of the neighbourhood pub. With COVID-19 keeping us at home, this column looks to provide bartending banter and well as recipes for you to make delicious cocktails at home.

The author is a bartender and resident of our West Edmonton community.

y role as a bartender is to pour drinks, prognosticate, and tell people things will be okay. Not since prohibition has pouring drinks been such an integral activity, and there's no shortage of advice required; it changes every day.

Pouring drinks and providing advice in public has been challenging in 2020. Towards the end of 2019, bartenders and soothsayers alike were asked what 2020 may bring.

A friend of mine, Robert Simonson, wrote a column in December 2019 for 'Punch' predicting 2020 to be the year of "No ABV Cocktails." I'm glad nobody can find my columns from 2019. Like the rest of us, Rob missed the mark. 2020 is perhaps the year to sit down and enjoy a nice drink. While 2020 hasn't completely stopped bartenders from pouring drinks, it's made our lives more difficult. I'm still happy to prognosticate though.

For this edition, we present for your drinking pleasure, the **Whisky Sour**. This drink had its heyday in the late 1800s. 'Sours' (made with any liquor) had existed for many decades prior, as they were popular drinks on board naval ships. With long months spent at sea, sailors ran a major risk of malnutrition, and the threat of developing scurvy as a result seemed imminent.

Eating citrus was an effective way to combat scurvy, so ships often left port with rations of lemons, limes, or oranges for sailors to eat. Given that refrigeration was also not available, sailors would take liquor like rum, whiskey, or gin on ships to have something safe to drink during long journeys. Over time, the citrus (usually lemon) was mixed with a liquor and water to create a drink that would not only quench thirst, but also effectively prevent the onset of scurvy. Win-win! I'm not saying we're at risk of scurvy, just that day-long Zoom calls may neccesitate some added cirtus in our diets.

The late 1880s may been the last time it was trendy. Today, this one is picked last for the classic cocktail team. It has suffered at the hands of unqualified bartenders. But if you watch your proportions carefully, can squeeze a lemon, and pour in a barspoon of sugar, this drink can't help but put a smile on your lips.

We can argue just how strong, sweet, or tart a good whisky sour should be. But it's a drink which you can meld to your identity. Use a good whisky (I prefer rye whisky with a 100% rye mash bill, ie. Alberta Premium), fresh juice, and shake it hard. This drink requires no garnish, we'll leave our drink some dignity.

I have endeavoured to provide satisfaction and remain humbly - yours in 90 proof,

INGREDIENTS:

2 oz Rye Whisky 3/4 oz Rich Simple Syrup 3/4 oz Lemon Juice

METHOD:

Combine all ingredients with ice in a cocktail shaker (or mason jar with lid) and shake vigorously until chilled (20-30 seconds).

Strain into a coupe or rocks glass.

For rich simple syrup, heat 1 cup sugar with ½ cup water in a saucepan over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until sugar is dissolved.

Remove from heat and cool. Store in a sealed, container.

To preserve, add ½ oz vodka.

BUFFALO SAUCE WITH BLUE CHEESE

CHELSEA CASAULT

"This sauce can be made as a pasta sauce, or you can drizzle it on omelettes or scrambled eggs, hot wings, as a buffalo blue cheese salad dressing... Anything that asks for buffalo flavour (and even things that doesn't)! It's just delicious!"

Ingredients:

1/3 cup Frank's Red Hot Sauce
1 1/2 tbsp Oil
1 1/2 tbsp Worcestershire Sauce
1/2 tsp Garlic Powder
1/2 tsp Onion Powder
2 tsp Green Tabasco Sauce
1 1/2 tsp Yellow Mustard
1 1/2 tbsp Honey
1/3 cup Blue Cheese (or more if you're feeling it)



In a small bowl, whisk together the Frank's Red Hot Sauce, oil, Worcestershire Sauce, garlic powder, onion powder, Green Tabasco Sauce, yellow mustard and honey. Add the sauce to your dish of choice and crumble blue cheese on top of your finished dish.

If you would like to serve the sauce hot, add it to a sauce pan and heat through, stirring often. You can add the blue cheese to the sauce pan and melt it for a creamy texture. Drizzle the sauce on to your dish of choice and if you wish, add blue cheese as a garnish.

It is delicious on baked chicken breast too! Season the chicken breast with poultry seasoning, salt and pepper and while baking the chicken @ 400F, flip the chicken over and brush it with the sauce every 10 minutes until the chicken is cooked through, about 50 mins. With 10 minutes remaining, crumble blue cheese on top of each chicken breast and let it melt in the oven. Serve hot!

DEEP DISH

MEATLASAGNA

ALISON KEPPLER

Meat Sauce Ingredients:

2 lbs lean ground beef

1 (28 oz/796 ml) can diced tomatoes

1 cup tomato paste

3 tbsp packed brown sugar

1 tbsp chopped fresh basil

1 ½ tsp kosher salt

1 tsp oregano

Cheese Filling Ingredients:

2 large eggs, lightly beaten

4 cups ricotta cheese

34 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

1 tbsp chopped fresh basil

1 tsp kosher salt

Other Ingredients:

12 oven-ready lasagna noodles 3 cups shredded mozzarella cheese, divided in half ½ cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese, for topping

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375° F. Coat a 13x9-inch baking dish with non-stick cooking spray.

For the sauce, in a large skillet, brown beef over medium-high heat. Drain and return to pan, adding diced tomatoes with their juice, tomato paste, brown sugar, basil, salt and oregano. Bring to a boil and then turn down to low, simmering for 30 minutes.

For the cheese filling, in a medium bowl, whisk eggs, ricotta, Parmesan, basil and salt.

To assemble, spread 1 cup of meat sauce in the prepared dish. Top with 4 noodles, half of the ricotta mixture, 1 ½ cups of mozzarella and 1 cup of meat sauce. Top with 4 more noodles, remaining ricotta and remaining mozzarella.

Place 4 remaining noodles on top, cover with remaining meat sauce and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered for 35 minutes.
