



INFORMATION ABOUT OUR NEW WARD

INFORMATION ADAPTED FROM: THE CITY OF EDMONTON

ur city's next municipal election happens this fall. On October 18, Edmontonians will elect a mayor and one councillor for each of the city's wards. There are 12 wards in total in the City

of Edmonton.

In previous elections, these wards were given numerical names (e.g. Ward 1, Ward 2, etc.). The Lessard Community League (until this election year) was within Ward 5.

As our city grows, it is common to review and (if necessary) revise ward boundaries to reflect current and planned populations.

As part of our City's most recent ward boundary review, Indigenous Elders and urban Indigenous community members approached City Council to consider renaming Edmonton's newly amended wards with Indigenous names. In 2020, Council directed City Administration and the Naming Committee of Council to explore new Indigenous names for the city's 12 wards.

Edmonton has been a gathering place for Indigenous Peoples for thousands of years. **iyiniw iskwewak wihtwawin** (the committee of Indigenous matriarchs) have gifted traditional names to the City's naming committee to honour these sacred places in Edmonton and to preserve their history for future generations.

Indigenous cultures traditionally uphold women as leaders in their communities, which is why they were chosen to lead this initiative. This is an opportunity for reconciliation for matriarchs to reclaim their roles within the community.

The committee is made up of 17 women from First Nations in Treaty No. 6, 7, 8, as well as Métis and Inuit representatives. They represent the Anishinaabe, Blackfoot, Cree, Dene, Inuit, Iroquois (Michel Band), Métis, and Sioux nations.

The Lessard Community League is now part of **ward sipiwiyiniwak** (pronounced **SEE-PEE-WIN-EE-WOK)**. A useful audio clip on how to pronounce sipiwiyiniwak (and the names of our city's other wards)can be found on our city's website.

LANGUAGE OF ORIGIN:

Enoch Cree


MEANING:

The people of the Enoch Cree Nation being River Cree.

Because of their proximity to the North Saskatchewan River, Enoch Cree Nation members were known as the River Cree to other tribes, or in the Cree language, sipiwiyiniwak.

In the 1800s, the Enoch Cree Nation was an area of 44 square miles that stretched from north of Big Island to present day Stony Plain Road. In 1884, Chief Enoch Lapotac signed an Adhesion to Treaty 6, but involuntary land surrenders caused the loss of over half of Enoch land. The Enoch First Nation, and its more than 2,500 members, is situated on Treaty 6 Territory in central Alberta, bordering the west side of the city of Edmonton. They continue to fight for their land rights today.

Our City and Province has many examples of Indigenous place names, including the North Saskatchewan River, Athabasca, Kannanaskis, Okotoks, Wetaskiwin, and Maskekosihk Trail. These new ward names are a way of honouring our City's indigenous history.

We'd like to extend a huge thank you to the many families and individuals who steps up to take regular weekly shifts, provide shift relief, and assist with shovelling and maintenance. We were all new this year, and the willingness to learn and support each other

was tremendous! Thanks also go out to the community members who've provided support in the form of words of encouragement and messages as we all find our way through this difficult year!

We'd also like to recognize the many 'kids' (in age and spirit) who followed the posted safety rules and requirements, and found ways to have fun on the ice. And to the deer in the neighbourhood who enjoyed the hay bale 'snacks' we left out this winter - you're welcome!

his fall, our community league became aware of a new City program called 'Pitch Your Project: Winter Doesn't Mean We Have to Hibernate!' Edmonton Community Leagues and other groups and organizations were invited to submit initiatives that can connect neighbours together and create stronger, more resilient communities in the face of COVID-19 and winter isolation.

Our board pitched the idea of acquiring sets of snowshoes for community members to use among their household/immediate cohorts as a way to be physically active (while remaining socially distant), share stories with neighbours, and explore the wonderful park systems our city and province have to offer. And you know what? We were accepted! As of December, the Lessard Community League is the proud owner of 2 sets of adult and 4 sets of child-sized snowshoes.

Instructions on how to borrow are on our website; in short we ask that community league members provide their membership info, and we arrange drop off and pick up times/locations with you. In between use, the snowshoes are checked over and sanitized. Borrowing is free for community league members!

While our snow so far hasn't been 100% ideal for snowshoeing, the response from borrowers has been great. We've found that most people who are borrowing the snowshoes have never done this before, and may not have had such an easy opportunity to do so. To date, our snowshoes have been walked as near as our community park and river bank, to as far away as Banff, Kannanaskis, Pigeon Lake, Wabamun Lake, Bunchberry Meadows, and Slave Lake! INTERESTED IN GROWING A COMMUNITY GARDEN IN OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD?

"To plant a garden is to believe in tomorrow."

oes the weather and short daylight hours of winter have you dreaming of spring? Have plans for growing next year's harvest, but nowhere to plant it?

A community garden is a group of people coming together to nurture, develop, and sustain a growing space in their community. Sometimes they are lead by faith groups, schools, community leagues, non-profit organizations, or owners of undeveloped or under-developed lands. This type of garden can reflect the area it serves; engaging, educating, building and strengthening community in a significant way. There are over 90 community garden sites now operating throughout the Edmonton region promoting local, organically grown food; healthy and active lifestyles; and safer, more vibrant and connected communities.

Community gardens contribute to healthy lifestyles and strong neighbourhoods by:

- providing fresh, safe, affordable herbs, fruits, and vegetables;
- helping to relieve stress and increase sense of wellness;
- getting people active, which improves overall physical health;
- providing social opportunities that build a sense of community and belonging; and
- giving people an opportunity to learn and share knowledge on gardening, nature, and cooking.

RESOURCES FOR STARTING AND RUNNING A COMMUNITY GARDEN

SUSTAINABLE FOOD EDMONTON www.sustainablefoodedmonton.org

Sustainable Food Edmonton is a non-profit charitable organization that initiates and supports projects and programs to encourage the building of community through urban agriculture. They connect communities and kids with their food, how it's produced, and the planet that makes it all possible. They provide grants annually to community gardens within Edmonton. If you are starting a new garden, looking to expand, renovate, or renew an existing community garden they can help with funding, resources and support.

The City of Edmonton has requirements for permanent and temporary community gardens located in open spaces, parkland, rights-of-way, and private land located in the city. These requirements have been updated to reflect COVID-19 safety protocols (e.g. sanitizing common touch points, limiting social gathering, etc.).

The City of Edmonton also operates a 'Pop-Up Community Gardens Pilot.' This pilot project provides additional food growing opportunities to the community with a goal to add over 350 gardening plots in 30 temporary garden sites across the city. Each selected site will be provided with seven to fiften planter boxes for community food production; the City will deliver the planter boxes (including soil) to each selected site and will also water each planter box twice per week.

Applications for the pilot project are available on the City's website, along with a list of other grant opportunities from public and private sources.

ABOUT THIS COLUMN

The Cocktail Corner is intend to be a light-hearted paper version of the neighbourhood pub. With COVID-19 keeping us at home, this column looks to provide bartending banter and well as recipes for you to make delicious cocktails at home.

The author is a bartender and resident of our West Edmonton community.



2021 have been difficult for many of us. A combination of -40 celcius temperatures and COVID-19 have made gathering with friends and family difficult. I find myself missing looking around a crowded bar and seeing my friends and patrons. We're all here because we're not all there...

I wanted to pick something simple and easy this month, something we all have the ingredients for in our fridges, or are easy to come by with a quick run to the our favourite alcohol provisions store.

This month, we present for your drinking pleasure: the Cosmopolitan. Or, as Carrie Bradshaw called it, the 'Cosmo.' The Cosmo wasn't invented by Sex and the City, but the show worked to hasten its demise.

Classics, and we may consider the 'Cosmo' a type of modern classic, have stood the test of time. They've been tweaked and improved. Sometimes the intervening years aren't kind for a drink. Bartenders using fake ingredients ruined a lot of great cocktails. I Doug Thomas firmly believe the '90s tried to kill the Cosmo.

hese first several weeks of Like any cocktail, stories about its invention are varied and many. Bartenders believe that the first recipe for a Cosmo appeared in 1934 in a book called *Pioneers* of Mixing at Elite Bars, but that drink has been tweaked in the intervening decades.

> We have Dale Degroff to thank for our version, he standardized the drink's recipe while working at the Rainbow Room in New York City around 1996.

With fresh lime juice, bright cranberries, and a healthy dose of vodka, a well made Cosmo is a treat. If you can, garnish with a flamed orange twist.

(For a really weird hack, and trust me on this, try lemon juice and raspberry jam if you don't have lime juice and cranberry juice).

Pour yourself a Cosmo, raise your glass, sip and smile and think of friends near and far.

INGREDIENTS:

1¹/₂ oz Absolut Citron 1 oz Cointreau (or other triple sec) ³⁄₄ oz lime juice 1 oz cranberry juice

OPTIONAL:

Evening gowns, cummerbunds

METHOD:

Combine all ingredients with ice in a cocktail shaker (or mason jar with lid) and shake vigorously until chilled (20-30 seconds).

Strain into a martini glass.

Garnish with an orange twist.

MODIFICATION:

For a decidedly wintery take on this classic, substitute regular cranberry juice with white cranberry juice, and garnish with 4-6 frozen cranberries.

ver walk through the neighbourhood - perhaps during a cultural holiday or a Sunday afternoon on a long weekend - and smell a delicious aroma in the air? COVID-19 may have us unable to get together for dinner, but it can't keep us from sharing meals that we love with one another. Thus, a new idea for the Lessard Community League Newsletter - sharing recipes we love with neighbours. Perhaps you have an old family favourite, a cultural dish you can't go without, or are taking this time of social distancing to try new things in your own personal test kitchen. Each edition we hope to have a few different submissions from community residents and area cooks to share. For Winter 2021, we have community members Lisa Baylis, Holly Carrington, and Britt Fedor.

MARVELOUS MACARONI AND CHEESE

Nothing hits the spot like mac n' cheese and with the past few weeks of frigid cold, this warms the heart and the stomach. I don't know how to cook for a small group - so this recipe will feed an army but it freezes perfectly and can be reheated in the oven on those nights you don't want to cook. This is my best break down of the recipe - but as with any good cook, measure with your heart. I hold no responsibility for anyone becoming addicted or getting clogged arteries. Enjoy at your own risk and no more than twice a year. Consult your physician!

Ingredients:

2 - 500g packages of pasta (shells or similar to hold the cheese sauce)
1/2 cup butter - with some extra for the topping
1/2 cup flour
1 litre half/half
6 cups old white cheddar, shredded (I get mine from the Italian Centre and ask for the sharpest white cheddar - the tang is worth it!)
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground nutmeg
1/2 cup italian breadcrumbs and cubed butter

Directions:

Prepare pasta as per direction - I keep mine a little more al dente as it will continue to cook in the oven with the sauce. Melt the butter in a large pot. When melted, add the flour and stir with a wooden spoon to create your roux. A nice nutty colour is good but don't let it darken too much. You can then begin to add your half/half. I do it gradually, warming the cream before adding the next bit. Stir constantly to make sure there are no clumps. Once incorporated, you can start the best part - adding the cheese. Add handfuls at a time and mix to melt the cheese. It will start to thicken and you can decide if you need more cream. You want it thick as opposed to runny but not too thick - you know, right? Keep your heat a medium so as not to burn the bottom - once the cheese sauce is gooey, you can add the nutmeg. That is the secret ingredient. Don't tell!! Drain your pasta but don't shake it - pasta water is our friend.

Pour the pasta into a large casserole dish - I use my nona's ancient lasagna pan. Pour the sauce over top and stir to get all that yummy sauce into the shells. You can certainly eat at this point but the best part is yet to come. Sprinkle the top with the italian breadcrumbs. Cube some butter on top of the breadcrumbs. Bake at 350 for 20-30 mins or until the top is golden and the cheese is bubbling. You can also divide the mixture into individual pans, following the same process for the topping - just don't bake. Pop them in your freezer and when you crave mac and cheese, toss in the oven and bake until bubbly. It's always a crowd pleaser and your neighbours may enjoy it too :) Buon Appetito!

BUMBLE CHICKEN

HOLLY CARRINGTON

Ingredients:

2-3 lbs chicken thighs or chicken breast cut into chunks
1 envelope onion soup mix
1/2 cup ketchup
1/4 cup brown sugar
3/4 cup water
3 tablespoons lemon juice
3/4 cup sliced mushrooms
1/2 medium sized onion chopped
3 celery stalks chopped

Flour to thicken sauce to desired consistency

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit and place chicken in a roaster. Combine soup mix,ketchup, brown sugar, water and lemon juice and mix together. Add cut veggies to the sauce and pour over chicken.

Cook for 45-50 min until chicken is thoroughly cooked.

Remove chicken and pour sauce into pot. Cook on medium heat and add flour to make a gravy. Once at desired consistency remove from heat and pour back over chicken and serve!

"I grew up on this recipe and it was passed down from my Grandma. We like to put the gravy on top of mashed potatoes, too. Super easy and delicious – even great as leftovers. We don't know really where the "Bumble" part of the name came from as my Grandma likes to call it "Celebration Chicken." It may have come as a joke, but it stuck and that's what we keep calling it!"



TRAFFIC SAFETY IN OUR Neighbourhood

The Lessard Community League Board was pleased to have a presentation from Cst. Clint Stallknect with the EPS Traffic Safety Branch at our February board meeting. Cst. Stallknect discussed how COVID-19 has impacted city-wide issues of traffic flow, noise, safety, and enforcement, and potential impacts of speed limit changes on residential streets.

Cst. Stallknect noted that EPS' ability to respond to traffic concerns is highly dependent on how complaints and cases are reported. If you see traffic issues in our neighbourhood (a single instance or ongoing matters), please report it to: **trafficcomplaints@edmontonpolice.ca**. This is a more effective way to report traffic issues than 311.

Be specific in your report (exact location of the concern, times/days of the occurence, vehicle identification information if applicable). This helps EPS identify trends and develop an effective strategy for enforcement!
